1914.

9th NOVEMBER.—Instructions from Ottawa were received by Lieut.-Col. G. W. Rennie (Hamilton) and Lieut.-Col. E. C. Ashton (Brantford) to form a composite battery, one section from each city.

16th NOVEMBER.—Composite 2nd Provisional Battery left Hamilton for Exhibition Grounds, Toronto. (Col. Rennie, Capt. Dunlop, Capt. Wright, and Lieut. Holland). Medical examination at Toronto.

30th NOVEMBER.—Attestation completed.

12th DECEMBER.—Inspection by Right Hon. R. L. Borden.

19th DECEMBER.—Battery Officers changed to Lieut.-Col. Rennie, A/Capt. Drew, Lieuts. Leather and Kerr, the last three having just arrived from R.S.A., Kingston.

21st DECEMBER.—12-pounder guns received for training.

1915.

10th JUNE.—Horses were received.

10th JUNE till 19th AUGUST.—Section training, battery training, brigade training, divisional training.

22nd AUGUST.—Entrained (Firing Battery only) to Trawsfynydd, Wales, for firing practice with 14th, 15th and 16th Batteries, C.F.A., and 2nd Canadian Heavy Battery. Firing practice carried out under Major-General Bruncker, Inspector General, R.A.

30th AUGUST.—Arrived back in Westenhanger. Captain Ryan posted to battery.

14th SEPTEMBER.—3 a.m., left camp, marched to Shorncliffe, entrained for Southampton, arriving 11 a.m. 7 p.m., advanced party sailed on *Mona Queen* for Le Havre, arriving 7 a.m., 15th September. 6 p.m., Main Battery party with equipment sailed on *Beleraphon* for Le Havre, arriving before advanced party, 5 a.m., 15th September.

15th SEPTEMBER.—6 p.m., entrained for St. Omer, via Boulogne and Calais.

16th SEPTEMBER.—Arrived 4 p.m.; detrained ready to move off 20 minutes; marched at once, heading for Caestre; much confusion, many lost. About 11 p.m. all ranks turned into a small, wet field "Somewhere in France" for the night.

1915.

17th SEPTEMBER.—Reveille 5 a.m. Marched to Caestre, arriving noon. Remained two days while officers reconnoitred battery positions in the Line.

19th SEPTEMBER.—8 a.m., Right Section proceeded to waggon lines, Neuve Eglise, followed at noon by Left Section.

20th SEPTEMBER.—Right Section relieved 1st Section, 429th Battery, R.F.A., after dark, Petit Pont position, Ploegsteert. (No smoking, no talking.)

21st SEPTEMBER.—Left Section completed relief.

26th SEPTEMBER.—Feint bombardment (600 rds. per battery) and demonstration to assist Loos Battle.

28th SEPTEMBER.—Capt. Ryan struck off strength (transferred).

11th OCTOBER.—Relieved by R.F.A.

11th OCTOBER.—During the night proceeded to near Vierstratt (position by Fanny's Farm and Engineers' Farm), arrived just before dawn at this empty position. Waggon lines "The Poplars," on the N. of La Clytte-Renninghest Road, half way between towns.

12th OCTOBER.—Capt. V. de B. Powell posted to Battery.

1915.

23rd OCTOBER.—Moved Battery position to the one newly built at Engineer's Farm, 500 yards in left rear of Fanny's Farm position. Moved waggon lines to foot of Kemmel Hill (La Clytte side).

1st NOVEMBER.—1st casualty of Battery and Brigade—Gnr. H. E. Stokes, wounded. Lieut. Leather went to 15th Battery and Lieut. Powell came from 15th Battery.

19th DECEMBER.—First experience of enemy gas, which blew down from his attack in Sanctuary Wood locality.

25th DECEMBER.—Christmas dinner at waggon lines and guns; big success.

1916.

4th JANUARY.—Position heavily shelled, personnel withdrawn twice.

NOTE.—A great deal of work was done on this battery position and waggon lines, resulting in exceedingly fine quarters all round.

13th FEBRUARY.—Relieved by a Lahore six-gun battery; proceeded to waggon lines.

14th FEBRUARY.—Proceeded from waggon lines to 1st Battery, C.F.A. waggon lines, near Romarin. That night relieved 1st Battery on Wolvergum, Petit Pont Road (Ploegsteert position). Here Sgt. J. T. Donnolly received D.C.M., first decoration to the Battery.

1916.

1st MARCH.—Lieut. Wright reposted.

2nd MARCH.—Relieved by 1st Battery, C.F.A., and proceeded same night to old position, Engineer's Farm; waggon lines near Locre.

27th MARCH.—St. Eloi Crater Show.

2nd APRIL.—Moved to new position behind Ridgewood, i.e., right front of Dickiebusch Lake.

5th APRIL.—Moved waggon lines to Outerdom.

7th APRIL.—Shelled out; Right Section moved 9 p.m. to position in Suicide Copse.

14th APRIL.—Left Section followed to Suicide Copse.

14th MAY.—Major G. E. Vansittart killed in his dugout; Lieut. Genelle and Lieut. Massey, and Orderly Room Sgt. N. B. Rimmer wounded by same shell, that came through the roof of the Major's dugout.

15th MAY.—Lieuts. Atkins and Gray posted temporarily; Capt. Dixon posted. While in Suicide Copse buried cable was put in from Division Artillery to Brigade and all batteries.

1916.

21st MAY.—Lieuts. Atkins and Gray left Battery.

2nd JUNE.—Lieut. T. H. Atkinson posted.

7th JUNE.—Leaving guns in Suicide Copse, personnel relieved an R.F.A. battery at Kruistratthoek Corner for a few days while they reorganised after very great casualties received during the 2nd of June show. During this time the D.A.C. manned three guns, and the 19th Battery one gun, left in Suicide Copse.

15th JUNE.—Returned to Suicide Copse.

1st JULY.—Fired two salvoes at noon to celebrate Dominion Day.

7th JULY.—Marched to Boescheppe, trained, and were inspected by Brig.-General E. W. B. Morrison.

14th JULY.—Went into action in "Doll's House position," Ypres-Cômines Canal, relieving 7th Battery, C.F.A. Waggon lines Outerdom.

27th AUGUST.—Relieved by 4th Australian Divisional Artillery, withdrawing to waggon lines.

28th AUGUST.—Marched to Bonninghues, via Cassel, etc., taking three days.

1916.

1st SEPTEMBER.—Capt. V. de B. Powell wounded.

6th SEPTEMBER.—Marched from Bonninghues to Ardrucq entrained.

7th SEPTEMBER.—Arrived Auxi le Chateau, 11 a.m. Marched to St. Omer (35 kilos.). Major Drew and Lieut. Curtis left from here to reconnoitre position in Mash Valley for Somme fighting.

9th SEPTEMBER.—Marched to near Senlis.

10th SEPTEMBER.—Marched to "Brickfield," just N.W. of Albert.

11th SEPTEMBER.—Before dawn put guns into action, "Mash Valley," just south of Ovillers, 25 yards from church.

15th SEPTEMBER.—Battle of Courcellette.

16th SEPTEMBER.—Preparatory barrage for Zollern Graben Trench and Mouquet Farm show. Battery shelled by H.V. gun.

17th SEPTEMBER.—Battery area heavily shelled. 12th Battery, on right, had five casualties.

18th SEPTEMBER.—Enemy bombing raid.

1916.

19th SEPTEMBER.—Enemy counter-attacked. Gained a footing in trenches N.E. of Courcelette.

20th SEPTEMBER.—Enemy attacked along whole front. Repulsed without aid of artillery. Communication between infantry and artillery very bad.

21st SEPTEMBER.—Ammunition dump at La Boisselle blown up by hostile artillery fire.

22nd SEPTEMBER.—A Sub. gun moved up to B position, half way between Ovillers and Pozieres.

23rd SEPTEMBER.—B Sub. gun moved up at dawn, followed by C and D Sub.'s guns. Sgt. Bailly severely wounded (died), Bdr. Daniels killed, Gnr. Moore slightly wounded.

25th SEPTEMBER.—Busy bringing up ammunition for proposed big push.

27th SEPTEMBER.—Enemy counter-attack. Battery fired all afternoon.

28th SEPTEMBER.—Enemy discovered massing troops. All batteries joined in area shoot. No further trouble.

10th OCTOBER.—Battery moved to C position (near Mouquet Farm). Order given to move at 7 p.m. Guns moved, D C B and A. All guns in position by 9.30 p.m. By 2.30 a.m. splinter cover (including roofs) were completed for all guns. This is the fastest building the Battery ever did. All material for roofs was torn from B position and built into C position in this time. Bothered a great deal by 77 cm. guns from Loupart Woods.

1916.

11th OCTOBER.—Quiet. Gnr. Allardyce wounded by premature.

12th OCTOBER.—Commence wire cutting in Regina Trench. Enemy shelled battery area with gas during night—most uncomfortable.

17th OCTOBER.—Ordered to get up 1,000 rounds per gun for proposed big show.

19th OCTOBER.—Very wet, gun pits flooded. Show postponed.

26th OCTOBER.—Bombarded Grandcourt Trench. Still very wet.

28th OCTOBER.—Nine ammunition and two G.S. waggons stuck in mud; drivers returned to W.L.; came up again at dawn to get them out.

30th OCTOBER.—Gale blowing. No work.

1st NOVEMBER.—Show again postponed.

2nd NOVEMBER.—Fired on working parties.

5th NOVEMBER.—Gnr. Connolly wounded (died), Bdr. Goldstraw wounded (died).

1916.

10th NOVEMBER.—Heavily bombarded Regina Trench. Wonderful fight in the air. One British against four Huns; shoot down two, the others making off.

11th NOVEMBER.—Captured Regina Trench.

13th NOVEMBER.—B.S.M. Rimmer wounded at guns.

14th NOVEMBER.—Enemy gas concentration. Battery received order to stay in another two weeks.

17th NOVEMBER.—Wire cutting as usual (in Desire Trench).

18th NOVEMBER.—Desire Trench taken. Zero hour 6 a.m. Misty day. Sgt. Donnolly and Bdr. Davis won Military Medals.

21st NOVEMBER.—Orders received about relief—great rejoicing.

25th NOVEMBER.—Saddler Cherbonneau killed. Gunner — wounded (died) by premature. Two horses killed, driver very lucky.

26th NOVEMBER.—Relief; handed over guns.

27th NOVEMBER.—Cleaned equipment, packed vehicles.

1916.

28th NOVEMBER.—Reveille 3.30 a.m. Commenced march.

29th NOVEMBER.—1st night Amplier, near Doullens.

30th NOVEMBER.—2nd night Rebrenne.

1st DECEMBER.—3rd night Hallicourt.

2nd DECEMBER.—4th day to waggon lines Hersin Cupigny; into action that night. Right Section Aix Noulette Wood; Left Section Corons d'Aix.

8th DECEMBER.—Right Section moved to Coron d'Aix.

25th DECEMBER.—Christmas dinner at waggon lines and gun position—huge success.

27th DECEMBER.—Heaviest shell gas concentration up till that time on battery areas (Bully Grenay); concentration from 10 p.m. till 7 a.m. next day.

1917.

10th JANUARY.—Largest raid of the war up till that time.

23rd JANUARY.—Right Section relieved by 1st Battery.

1917.

24th JANUARY.—Left Section relieved by 1st Battery.

25th JANUARY.—Marched to Marest. Great difficulty with slippery frozen roads.

28th JANUARY.—Marched to Nedon, where we trained and rested. Cold weather—men in unheated barns. Great difficulty with frozen slippery roads.

16th FEBRUARY.—Marched to waggon lines, Camblain-L'Abbe—very slippery roads. Into action same night, relieving 38th Battery, C.F.A., in "Plank Road Position," just in front of Plank Road and on S.E. side of Maroeuil—Neuville St. Vaast Road, half way between towns.

11th MARCH.—Withdrew to waggon lines on being relieved by 12th Battery, C.F.A.

25th MARCH.—Moved into battle position 400 yards west of Aux Reitz Corner, relieving 25th Battery, C.F.A. From this position we carried out preliminary bombardment for the Vimy show.

28th MARCH.—The Battery was re-organised on the six-gun establishment, being reinforced by a Section of 81st Battery, C.F.A., under Lieut. W. H. Larkin, which had just arrived from England. At this time the whole C.F.A. was re-organised on a six-gun battery basis. Lieut.-Col. Sharman returned to England, and Lieut.-Col. J. S. Stewart, formerly 7th Bde., C.F.A., took command of 4th Bde.

1917.

9th APRIL.—Vimy-Arras Battle.

NOTE.—The previous six weeks were the hardest on transport that have been experienced during the whole war. In spite of every effort the weather was so bad (rain, snow, cold winds) and the work so great that all the available army remounts were consumed, and by the end of the battle this Battery (which was an average sample of the C.F.A.) had 92 horses instead of 165. Of the 92 not more than 30, including chargers, were even in fair condition; the remainder were only kept because they could, by working every third or fourth day, help the situation somewhat. During this period all the roads were simply lined with dead horses—a terrific sight.

9th APRIL.—Waggon lines moved to half a mile east of Mt. St. Eloi. 1 p.m., Right Section advanced to cemetery, Neuville St. Vaast. Remainder followed before dark.

18th APRIL.—Commenced work on gun position on right of Vimy Acheville Road, half a mile east of railway (Mt. Foret Quarry position). Also commenced packing ammunition by night. Great difficulty with mud and enemy artillery fire. Many casualties.

20th APRIL.—Lieut. Wilson attempted without success to take two guns to above position. Many casualties to other batteries moving same night; roads badly congested, guns and men left on Farbus Hill.

21st APRIL.—Two guns from Farbus Hill placed in position. Dvr. Currie killed taking guns into action.

22nd APRIL.—Remaining four guns placed in position.

30th APRIL.—Sig. W. Swift killed at guns.

1917.

3rd MAY.—Battle of Arleux en Gohelle and Fresnoy. Battery heavily punished by enemy counter-battery fire, five guns being put out of action. Lieut. A. Chaplin killed at guns; B.S.M. Toms wounded.

4th MAY.—Moved to Willerval position. Bdr. N. Kirkpatrick missing.

7th MAY.—Dvr. S. J. Foster killed. Two drivers wounded and seven gassed, also Lieut. N. Curtis, gassed while moving ammunition from Vimy-Acheville Road position to new position (Willerval).

9th MAY.—Bdr. Douglas killed; two gunners wounded.

18th MAY.—Waggon lines moved to old Aux Reitz gun position.

24th MAY.—Major G. L. Drew, D.S.O., left Battery for leave in England, where he went into hospital, being in a very run-down condition physically. His illness proved so serious that he was invalided out of the C.E.F. and sent to Canada.

4th JUNE.—Withdrew to Aux Reitz waggon lines.

5th JUNE.—Moved to new position old German support line trench in Souchez Valley for "La Coulotte Show." Two gunners wounded with aeroplane bombs while moving in the guns at night. During the next three days we built six gun pits with splinter cover.

1917.

8th JUNE.—Moved waggon lines to Carency.

10th JUNE.—La Coulotte Show.

11th JUNE.—Withdrew to waggon lines.

15th JUNE.—Returned to same gun position.

20th JUNE.—Withdrew to same waggon lines.

25th JUNE.—Mounted Battery inspected by Brig.-General C. H. MacLaren, D.S.O., the new C.R.A. In June the Canadian Corps Artillery was once more re-organised, and the 3rd Brigade of the 1st Can. Divn. and 4th Brigade, 2nd Can. Divn. were taken complete and formed into the 4th C.D.A. (Brig.-Gen. C. H. McLaren, D.S.O., C.R.A.), the D.A.C. being made up by detaching sections from 1st, 2nd and 3rd D.A.C.'s. By this the Lahore Div. Arty. (Indian Army), which had in succession covered the 2nd, 3rd and 4th Canadian Inf. Divisions, was relieved, and the Canadian Corps became completely a Canadian unit.

25th JUNE.—Moved back into Souchez Valley position.

28th JUNE.—Avion Show.

29th JUNE.—Moved forward to School House position, Lievin.

1917.

1st JULY.—Three Corps Salvoes at noon to celebrate Dominion Day.

26th JULY.—Moved to Bois D'Hirondelle, relieving 346 Bty., R.F.A., taking over their brand new guns.

NOTE.—While in this position there were a number of smaller shows for Cite du Moulin.

4th AUGUST.—Lieuts. C. H. Watson and C. W. Doheny joined the Battery.

6th AUGUST.—Commenced work on new waggon lines for winter at Ablain St. Nazaire, Lieut. Doheny in charge.

15th AUGUST.—Hill 70; fake bombardment at commencement, smoke barrage during show. Lots of good sniping in back country as enemy troops moved to and from Hill 70 area.

21—26 AUGUST.—Green Crassier Show. Very intense fighting; exceedingly heavy infantry casualties in desperate fighting around ruins. Five enemy counter-attacks repulsed first day. Lieut. Reid received M.C. for services as Bn. Liaison Officer.

3rd SEPTEMBER.—Moved into new waggon lines, Ablain St. Nazaire.

6th SEPTEMBER.—Withdrew personnel to Waggon lines for seven days' rest, 27th Battery taking over guns in position.

1917.

13th SEPTEMBER.—Personnel returned to old gun position, relieving 27th Battery Personnel.

17th SEPTEMBER.—Because the Bois d'Hirondelle position had been heavily shelled during the week the 27th Battery personnel occupied it; we moved Battery to new position in Cemetery of Lievin, occupying old pits built earlier in the summer by the R.F.A.

19th SEPTEMBER.—Commenced forward position in front of Cite de Bois de Lievin. Commenced hauling ammunition same night. This was for proposed Sallaumines Hill Show, which was later cancelled as the Can. Corps had to go and take Passchendaele.

26th SEPTEMBER.—Being relieved by personnel of 27th Battery, C.F.A. Our personnel withdrew to waggon lines for one week's rest.

30th SEPTEMBER.—Lieut. C. H. Watson and complete section (without guns) went to Nedon to demonstrate enfilade barrage, with borrowed guns, to Infantry preparing for Sallaumines Show.

3rd OCTOBER.—Personnel re-occupied gun position, relieving 27th Battery personnel.

6th OCTOBER.—Lieut. A. R. Cummings joined Battery.

9th OCTOBER.—Relieved by 8th Battery, C.F.A.; withdrew to waggon lines.

1917.

11th OCTOBER.—9 p.m., Lieut. C. H. Watson and composite section rejoined Battery from Nedon.

12th OCTOBER.—6.30 a.m., commenced march toward Ypres, spending that night at Gonnehem.

13th OCTOBER.—Marched to Chocques.

14th OCTOBER.—Marched to Steenvoorde.

15th OCTOBER.—Marched to new waggon lines, half a mile west of Vlamertinghe, on side of a plank road; very wet weather, no shelter. *German night bombers very active.*

16th OCTOBER.—Took over four guns in action from an R.F.A. Battery. The position was just south of Ypres-Zonnebeke Road, just where a small road had joined the main one from the south; about 500 yards west of the junction of the Ypres-Zonnebeke Road and the Ypres-Roulers Railway. Large concrete "Pill-Box," which easily withstood direct hits from Hun 8in. H.E. shells, immediately behind Battery. Intense enemy counter-battery fire; eight guns destroyed in this position by direct hits. Many casualties saved by "Pill-Box." Mud so bad by the effect of shell fire on the waterlogged country that movement overland for any distance was only possible by duck-board walks. Many casualties from enemy harassing fire on these walks. Preventative barrage by all our guns covering 1,000 yards in depth every dawn and dusk. Advance was made in three phases, culminating in the capture of Passchendaele, 30th October.

29th OCTOBER.—Gnr. T. English killed at guns, Gnrs. Clarke and Harrison shell-shocked.

1917.

30th OCTOBER.—Gnr. Walters wounded at guns.

4th NOVEMBER.—Dvr. Boomer killed by High Velocity shell in waggon lines.

5th NOVEMBER.—Expecting a huge counter-attack by the enemy, two composite batteries were hurriedly organised in our Division during the evening, obtaining guns from Divisional Pool. These were ready for action before dawn, but the counter-attack petered out. Lieut. Watson commanded composite section from the Battery.

12th NOVEMBER.—Being relieved by an R.F.A. Battery, who took over our six guns in action; personnel moved to waggon lines.

13th NOVEMBER.—Commencing 7.30 a.m., marched to Caestre.

14th NOVEMBER.—Marched to Steenbecque.

15th NOVEMBER.—Marched to Ham En Artois.

16th NOVEMBER.—Marched to Marles-les-Mines.

17th NOVEMBER.—Marched to Fresnicourt.

1917.

18th NOVEMBER.—Marched to waggon lines, La Targette Corner, relieving 16th Battery at their waggon lines. On same day took over guns from an R.F.A. Battery in position at Petit Vimy, with detached section 1,000 yards to S.E.; i.e., just near a windmill half way between Vimy and Farbus.

30th NOVEMBER.—Being relieved by 18th Battery, C.F.A., who took over guns, the Battery personnel withdrew to waggon lines.

1st DECEMBER.—Marched to Marles-les-Mines. While here Lieut.-Col. M. N. Ross, D.S.O., took command of the 4th Bde., C.F.A. Here also Brig.-General King held a mounted inspection.

18th DECEMBER.—Lieut. W. H. Larkin appointed Adjutant of 4th Bde., C.F.A. Christmas dinner; great success. This morning Lieuts. Wilson and Atkinson and R.O.'s party proceeded to look over position (Lake Position), S.E. corner of Cite du Bois de Lievin.

21st DECEMBER.—One section marched to Ablain St. Nazaire, going into action that night, relieving 11th Battery in action and waggon lines, taking over guns. Roads very slippery.

22nd DECEMBER.—Remaining two sections marched to Ablain St. Nazaire, Lieut. Reid in charge, and completed reliefs.

1918.

3rd JANUARY.—Moved to our old waggon lines in Ablain St. Nazaire.

1918.

23rd JANUARY.—Relieved 60th Battery in position north of Lieven-Lens Road, in most easterly houses of Lievin. Detached section in buildings in east of Mines administration building, Lievin. Took over guns.

25th JANUARY.—Commenced building new gun position at Angre Corner.

27th JANUARY.—Lieut. Doheny and Bdr. Spiers slightly wounded at Angre Corner.

29th JANUARY.—Moved four guns to Angre Corner position. Lieut. A. R. Cumming commenced rebuilding detached section position. These positions were exceedingly strong and famous for their comfort, including even an enamelled bath with heater.

1st FEBRUARY.—Lieut. W. J. Price joined the Battery.

9th FEBRUARY.—Lieut. Reid left Battery to be captain of 32nd Battery, C.F.A.

10th FEBRUARY.—Lieut. J. O'Dell joins Battery.

21st FEBRUARY.—Lieut. J. O'Dell leaves to join R.A.F.

4th MARCH.—Enemy put on an exceedingly intense raid, using flamenwerfers. This was so intense that we all thought the much-heralded Spring offensive was on. This, however, soon petered out. Moved one section to forward position, Cite St. Pierre for a raid the following night.

1918.

5th MARCH.—Raid.

6th MARCH.—Withdrew guns before dawn to Angre Corner position.

21st MARCH.—We again had a section in Cite St. Pierre position for a bombardment after a huge gas projector attack.

22nd MARCH.—Relieved 15th Battery (four guns) in north of Lievin, taking over guns, keeping our detached section in same old position.

28th MARCH.—Withdrew to waggon lines, having handed over guns in position to an R.F.A. Battery.

29th MARCH.—Marched from waggon lines at Ablain St. Nazaire to Acq, going into action by plank road half a mile N.E. of Rochlincourt on an S.O.S. call, the Hun having made a determined attack on this sector to capture Arras and Vimy Ridge. Waggon lines in the open for the night.

30th MARCH.—Moved waggon lines to comfortable quarters at Ecurie.

4th MAY.—Marched to Acq.

6th MAY.—Marched to Agnieres. Intensive training in open warfare tactics.

22nd MAY.—Marched to Rocourt; continued training.

30th MAY.—Inspected by Brig.-Gen. King and Major-Gen Watson.

18th JUNE.—Div. Arty. Gymkana on hill near La Comte.

23rd JUNE.—Marched to Amettes; fired two days on practice ranges testing new pattern range drums, calibration, and tank shooting.

26th JUNE.—Marched back to Rocourt. ...

1st JULY.—Corps sports at Tinqes.

4th JULY.—Inspected at Tinqes by Hon. J. A. Calder.

10th JULY.—Inspected at Tinqes by Lieut. Gen. A. W. Currie.

11th JULY.—Marched to waggon lines, Mt. St. Eloi.

1918.

12th-13th JULY.—Moved waggon lines to Bray, relieving C Battery, 256 Bde., 51st Highland Division. Put guns into action on these two nights. One gun detached 700 yards forward.

20th JULY.—Major Macpherson transferred to D.A.C. Lieuts. C. H. Johnson and Cummings transferred to R.A.F.

1st AUGUST.—On being relieved by 277 Bde., 51st Highland Division, R.F.A., we withdrew to waggon lines, marching the same night to Savy.

2nd AUGUST.—9 p.m., started march to Authieule (near Doulens); arrived 8 a.m.

3rd AUGUST.—8 p.m., started march to Foret de Vignacourt, arriving 4 a.m.

4th AUGUST.—8 p.m., started march for Boves Wood, arriving 6 a.m.

5th AUGUST.—At dusk moved guns to Battery position in the open near woods, half way between Gentelles and Domart.

8th AUGUST.—Amiens Show. 4th Army. Australians on left, French on right. Zero hour 4.20 a.m. Advanced 13 kilos. Right Section, with Lieuts. Watson, Reddie and Price, was with composite contact Battery. Composite Battery commanded by Major C. Sifton. Major C. Sifton and Sgt. Locke slightly wounded at guns.

1918.

9th AUGUST.—Spent near Cayeux Wood.

10th AUGUST.—Came into action at dawn, just S.W. of Vrely. Same afternoon moved position to 500 yards west of Mehari-court. Waggon lines beside guns heavily shelled. Dvr. Hogan killed. Waggon lines moved to Vrely. Gun position bombed and machine-gunned by Hun Airmen toward evening.

11th AUGUST.—Gun position heavily shelled. Lieut. C. H. Watson killed at guns; Lieut. R. J. McKenzie, Corpl. Thomas and Gnr. T. J. Miller wounded.

12th AUGUST.—Moved to new position 500 yards in rear.

15th AUGUST.—Lieut. G. R. L. Hill joined Battery.

20th AUGUST.—Dvr. F. Morley wounded in waggon lines.

22nd AUGUST.—Waggon lines moved to Caix on account of shelling.

25th AUGUST.—On being relieved by 34 and 35 French Div. Arty., 36th French Corps, moved during night to woods one mile N. of Ignacourt.

26th AUGUST.—Marched to Toutencourt.

1918.

27th AUGUST.—Marched to Saulty.

28th AUGUST.—Marched to Lattre St. Quintin.

29th AUGUST.—Marched at night to Achicourt.

30th AUGUST.—Marched to St. Martin sur Conjeul.

31st AUGUST.—Moved to Waincourt. Gnr. Tetlow wounded in waggon lines. Same evening put guns in action along trench in valley just south of Arras-Cambrai Road. One and a half miles west of Vis-en-Artois.

2nd SEPTEMBER. Drocourt-Queant Show. Moved guns to position S.W. of Dury Hill—4,000 yards advance. Corpl. Lawrence wounded with Forward Section. Lieut. J. R. Stubbs joined Battery.

3rd SEPTEMBER.—Moved guns half a mile east of Villers Lez Cagnicourt. Gnr. Sommerville and Gnr. Bailey wounded with Forward Section. Lieut. S. H. Wilson in charge of Contact Section, September 2nd and 3rd.

4th SEPTEMBER.—Major C. Sifton and Lieut. E. B. F. Reddy wounded at Battery.

1918.

6th SEPTEMBER.—Relieved by 38th Battery, C.F.A.; moved same night to Etrun. Waggon lines shelled before leaving; Dvr. Short killed.

10th SEPTEMBER.—Moved to Habarque.

21st SEPTEMBER.—Lieuts. Simonds and Kingsford joined Battery.

22nd SEPTEMBER.—Marched to staging area, near Croisilles.

25th SEPTEMBER.—Relieved R.F.A. Battery at railway and road crossing north of Pronville, taking over guns. Position in Hindenburg Line.

27th SEPTEMBER.—Bourlon Wood Show. Took position just after dawn between Inchy and Canal du Nord; i.e., across No Man's Land, and from there took part in second phase of attack. This was only possible by the smoke barrage which screened enemy observation from Bourlon Wood, which had not at that time been taken. Moved position same evening to just north of Quarry Wood. Gnr. McCallum wounded at guns, later killed on way to Dressing Station. Corpl. R. Cameron, Corpl. J. Mitchen, Bdr. King and Gnr. A. Patterson wounded at guns.

28th SEPTEMBER.—Moved guns to north side of Arras-Cambrai Road by a farmhouse one and a quarter miles west of Raillencourt. Gnr. Painter wounded at guns, later died of wounds. Same night bomb lit in waggon lines one and a half miles west of guns, killing 28 horses and wounding Dvrs. Dawson, Melville, Blackmore, Monroe, Baird, Clarke, Nelson, Hogg and Corpl. Riddell; Dawson died of wounds. Sigs. Murray and Klock wounded on Officer's Patrol; Klock died of wounds.

1918.

29th SEPTEMBER.—Another show. Severe fighting, little progress. Shell in waggon lines killed Dvr. Gagne and wounding Dvr. W. Lawson, also killing eight horses. Moved up one section in afternoon under Lieut. Stubbs and Simonds. At 11 p.m. received orders to move up remainder of Battery to forward section position on sunken road just south of Haynecourt for show before dawn next day.

30th SEPTEMBER.—Show zero hour 4.30 a.m. Enemy had planned his decisive counter-attack with eight divisions on our two division front to commence this morning at 5 a.m. Counter-battery fire very intense; two guns out of action by shell fire. Gnr. R. Leitch killed at guns; Sergts. H. Murray and Foster and Gnr. W. Hershall wounded at guns. Terrific fighting by Infantry; attacks, counter attacks, etc; terrific casualties, especially in Infantry. Moved guns back in afternoon to former position. Gnr. Spearn wounded during night by stray shell at guns.

1st OCTOBER.—Another show. Progress slight on account of reduced strength of units. Advanced Battery 1,000 yards to next little dip in front.

4th OCTOBER.—Moved position to rear across Arras-Cambrai Road, then withdrew to waggon lines same night.

6th OCTOBER.—During evening marched to Vis en Artois.

10th OCTOBER.—Into action at Ricourt, relieving an R.F.A. Battery.

11th OCTOBER.—Moved waggon lines to Eterpigny.

1918.

12th OCTOBER.—Moved guns to Lecluse.

14th OCTOBER.—Moved waggon lines to Lecluse.

17th OCTOBER.—Moved guns to trench three-quarters of a mile S.W. of Le Moulinet.

18th OCTOBER.—Hun retreat commenced. Advanced Battery to woods one mile N.E. Erchin. Waggon lines at Erchin.

19th OCTOBER.—Moved guns to Hornaing. First civilians met in Bruille. Brigade received a tremendous reception from all civilians en route, as it was the first mounted troops through these towns, including Somain. Civilians decorated men and horses with flowers, French flags, etc.

20th OCTOBER.—Moved to just west of Bellevue to cover 4th Can. Div. Infantry, we having been covering the 1st Canadian Div. Infantry during the advance up to this time.

21st OCTOBER.—Moved forward to Herin, via Oisy.

23rd OCTOBER.—Moved forward to Raismes. Waggon lines moved to Raismes.

28th OCTOBER.—Corpl. Spiers killed by a shell on Raismes-Aubrey Road, while in charge of ammunition waggons.

1918.

29th OCTOBER.—Withdrew guns to Belaing, then put them in action the same night near Trith St. Leger.

1st NOVEMBER.—Show for Mt. Huy and Valenciennes. Moved guns to Poirier Farm; Dvr. W. Carpenter and Gnr. J. McDonald wounded. Lieut. Hill and Sigs. Leyton, Lowe and Simpson gassed while on Officer's Patrol.

2nd NOVEMBER.—Moved guns to near aerodrome about half way to Valenciennes.

3rd NOVEMBER.—Moved guns through Valenciennes to Marly.

4th NOVEMBER.—Forward Battery advanced to Estreux. Corpl. Underwood wounded.

5th NOVEMBER.—Moved in evening to Rombies.

6th NOVEMBER.—Fired barrage. The last firing this Battery did during the war.

7th NOVEMBER.—Marched back during day to Valenciennes.

11th NOVEMBER.—Lieut.-Col. Ross, D.S.O., announced to Muster Parade that an Armistice was signed.

15th NOVEMBER.—Capt. R. Kent, M.C., joins Battery.

1918.

16th NOVEMBER.—Marched to Elouges expecting to proceed to Coblenz as Army of Occupation.

19th NOVEMBER.—Orders being changed, we marched to Cuesmes, where we remained for some time. Lieut. Kingsford transferred to England.

12th DECEMBER.—Marched to Haine St. Pierre.

13th DECEMBER.—Marched to Petit Courcelles.

14th DECEMBER.—Marched to Lambusart.

16th DECEMBER.—Marched to Spy.

17th DECEMBER.—Marched to Aische en Refail.

26th DECEMBER.—Christmas dinner.

1919.

3rd JANUARY.—Marched to Nil St. Vincent

4th JANUARY.—Marched to Mousty.

1919.

21st MARCH.—Guns, vehicles, harness, and all but personnel equipment turned into 4th Canadian Divisional Ordnance, Chateau at Limelette. All but transport and Officers' horses turned in by this time.

15th APRIL.—Marched to Wavre, entrained (2 p.m.) for Le Havre. Good trip, good rations, heated box cars for all ranks.

17th APRIL.—Arrived Le Havre early in morning. Detrained 6 a.m. Held up several days on account of English seamen strikes.

25th APRIL.—Sailed for England (Bramshott Camp).
